## SUMMARY OF THE WEBINAR

Little is known about teachers in prison in France today. As they do not generate interest among researchers, there is limited data to characterize them. This round table aims at correcting this lack of knowledge and recognition by proposing a crossover of views and insights: those of the person responsible for prison education at the national level, a prison teacher, and a researcher. This provides an opportunity to question the relevance of describing and defining a prison teaching status. Indeed, as Bruno Milly (2004) refers to the teaching profession in prison as stemming from a “rift in professional logic”, the three presentations will attempt to isolate key elements which would make it possible to characterize and unify it.
